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Course Description

This class centers on the elements and principles of design with students working toward visualizing characters for Encore Co. stage productions. Students develop skills in costume design and construction while costuming four plays per year, and they gain a basic knowledge of elements of costume design, including color, line, shape, and texture; and principles of design, including harmony and balance. They learn the role of costume designer from the initial design stage through dress rehearsals, organizing and managing costumes during the course of productions. They apply design elements to rendering theatrical costumes, and they are versed in a basic history of costumes in the theatre.

Class Expectations

- Due to the collaborative nature of this course, all students are expected to actively participate, cooperate, abide by all safety regulations, and demonstrate respect for their peers and supplies in the classroom and while working backstage.
- Cell phones and other items of distraction should not be used in class.

Assignments & Grading Policy

- Demonstrate your work ethic through daily participation
 - All projects are completed in class.
- ⇒ Participating in the design and construction of costumes is the goal of this class. If you are absent, you are missing the experience, therefore, your grade will be negatively affected. After four absences (per quarter), zeros will be given for participation regardless of the reason for the absence, excused or unexcused. Outside assignments will not be offered to increase your grade.
- Design Projects and Production Projects
 - 1st Semester Quarter assessments
 - 2nd Semester Production Design Presentation and Costume Portfolio
 - Each semester grade is the average of the two quarter grades.
 - Late work is not an option.

Four trips per year are offered to Boise theaters. These are not a required part of the course.
